# Garry's thought

'Now is the winter of our discontent'

This is the first line of Shakespeare's Richard III and its always resonated with me as I reflect on what the Christmas and Easter seasons means for me.

Let me explain.

Living in North Queensland is a unique experience. For those new to the area it can be a somewhat strange experience when it comes to observing the psychology of people around them. There are things that go on and things that just stop in North Queensland due to the combined effect of mango season and cyclone season. Tempers get shorter as the days get longer and the humidity rises. Often brains shut down a bit and the frenetic pace of life subsides for a while...a mango smoothie will do that to you.

Trying to explain to southerners that attempting to fire up the troops when the humidity is over 90% and the temps are in the mid 30's is a pointless task in and of itself. Both Christy and I have, on occasions, rolled our eyes at proposed fantastical programs intended to kick off in February or March. We just shrug our shoulders and think, "Good luck there". Let alone explaining that "Yes, roads up here can be cut not just for an hour or so, but days, weeks and even months." So, chuck in Covid restrictions and you can quickly create a boiling stew of discontent.

Its our own "Wet season of discontent".

And for many North Queenslanders, Easter marks that transition point from wet season to the dry (or less wet) season and coincides with the end of the mango season as well (which I define as Halloween to Easter...its close enough). Its the time when you feel that the cogs of community are starting to grind back to life as airconditioners begin to hum rather that roar and the BOM site gets a lot less hits. Its also a time when many breathe a sigh of relief that their clothes are not drenched with sweat by 9am and nights are actually cool and refreshing and no longer a dark suppressing stew. Yep, for North Queensland, Easter really marks the end of last year and the beginning of a new year.

But, for at least one more week, there is the post Easter pause. This is when many ministers of the church catch their breathe after a busy Easter weekend and chocolate comatosed people munch quietly through those Easter eggs that have ended up in the bottom of the fridge because no-one has the heart to bin them.

Even the common Lectionary has a bit of a holiday as the drama of Easter makes us pause for a few weeks. We get the resurrection on Easter Sunday, followed by doubting Thomas the next Sunday and then Luke's version of this on the third Sunday...all of which occurred on the same day.

So, as we awake from our wet season coma and gear up for the rest of the year, just let this week be a time to reframe your lives. A time to align yourself to the mission and character of Jesus. And a time to reflect on a long. hot, sweaty and reasonably wet wet season and seek God's word as we emerge to face the year ahead.

You know that the famous first line of Richard III should always be read with the second line. "made glorious summer by this sun of York" So, what Richard is saying is that we are now at the depth of the winter but the son of York (Edward) is like the sun of Summer and good times are on the way. And so for us in North Queensland, we can say "Now is the wet season of our discontent, made glorious dry season by this Son of God."

Happy Easter everyone. May you emergence from the depths of the wet bring new life and hope to your lives, your ministries and your families.
