Christy's Thoughts

A couple of weeks ago I experienced what is commonly called "A FALL". My foot ended up on the edge of a concrete patio and gravity took over. I very ungraciously landed face first on the grass. Now you might think that this was a good thing because at least I did not land on the concrete and that is true. The problem wasn't so much that I landed face first on the grass, it was that I used my face to stop my movement, in other words my face slide across some gravel and then came to a stop on grass.

It was spectacular to look at with skin missing, glasses broken and a dent in the lawn that looked a bit like the trajectory of a comet coming to a complete stop on the earth's surface. Thankfully, I didn't damage anything really, apart from my glasses which thanks to my daughter are being held together by superglue until the new ones arrive.

I think the worst part was that there was visible evidence of my encounter with the ground with grazing, a slightly swollen forehead and nose and bruises on my legs. Of course, people enquired what happened and so I started thinking about a story which involved me stepping into a bar fight to save the day! But given that it happened around 11am I realised that this would raise other questions which included why I was in a bar at 11am.

So, I had to tell the boring, undignified truth and then suffer the mess my face became as the wounds healed. If I can say anything good about the whole affair it is that I have always healed pretty quickly, so the evidence disappeared after a few days.

What didn't disappear however were the aches and pains that come when one decides to throw themselves on the ground. My pajama pants kept catching on my gravel rashed knees and when you have a sore forehead it is made even sorer when you frown which apparently, I do far more often than I realised. I also discovered that I rub my forehead when I am puzzled or thinking about something. This too is not good when where you apparently usually rub is an open wound!

You might be wondering why I am sharing this horror story and to be fair I did look a bit scary! I guess the truth is that I don't like to think of myself as someone who can so easily be hurt. I didn't enjoy the after effects for the next few days, and I had to recognise that I am no longer going to heal as quickly as I once did.

But through it all I was so very grateful that God created us to be healed. Our bodies have been made to recover, to generate new skin and to dissolve bruises. We are indeed wonderfully made and whilst we may struggle to see the joy of our appearance as we look in the mirror, let us not forget the complex system of interconnected nerves, tissue and all those other parts of our bodies that make us who we are.

Yes, it might still hurt to rub my forehead sometimes, and yes there are photos which will be around long after I have forgotten about the event, but there will be no visible signs that I was hurt. Well except for the crater in Christine's lawn but a bit of topsoil will sort that out!

We are wonderfully made by God's hand and loved beyond measure! Now that is something to celebrate!

Season of Creation is a global movement where Christians are invited to celebrate, pray and act to protect creation. It runs each year from 1st September (the day of prayer for creation) to 4th October (feast day of St Francis).

Church Fire

In May, a fire broke out in a Uniting Church, sadly resulting in significant damage to equipment and the building's interior. No one was injured as the building wasn't occupied at the time of the fire. Investigations have found that the fire most likely originated from plugged-in electrical equipment on the platform. One of the learnings identified through the management of this matter is regarding electrical safety and, in particular, the need to ensure that we "*turn off*" electrical appliances after use.

Could this happen at your church?

There are some simple things that you can do to reduce the risk of an electrical fire in your church, including:

- 1. Turn off electrical appliances and unplug them when not in use
- 2. Keep flammable objects away from electrical outlets and cords
- 3. Limit the use of space heaters
- 4. Don't overload your outlets by piggybacking multiple power boards to the one outlet
- 5. Avoid the use of double adaptors
- 6. Regularly complete your scheduled electrical safety inspections and tests of safety switches
- 7. Check the condition of equipment and remove damaged devices/ leads.

If you have any concerns or questions regarding fire and electrical safety, don't hesitate to contact the <u>Work Health and Safety team</u>, who would be happy to discuss.

Safe Ministry with Children

Principle 5 of the 10 Principles for a Safe Uniting Church

<u>Recruitment</u> and screening of all people who work or volunteer with the Church are vital to keeping everyone safe. All new volunteers and lay staff participate in pre-appointment screening and are appointed by the Church Council. All volunteers and lay workers sign a <u>Statement of Personal Commitment</u> each year. These processes ensure that we all have regular conversations about safe boundaries and respectful relationships and encourage us to speak up if we are concerned.
