# **Greetings from Garry**

A few weeks ago I had the absolute privilege to be the support person for Ueli (George) 'Otumuli as he faced the Synod Selection Committee panels in Brisbane. I felt for Ueli. I saw in his eyes exactly what I went through over 25 years ago when I faced the SSC. At that time, my support person was also a Presbytery Minister, Rev Dennis Robinson.

As I draw closer to my final year as a Presbytery Minister, I could not help but have a feeling of de-ja-vu and that, as I sat next to Ueli as he struggled at times to land on the right words, just as I did all those years ago, I felt a strong confirmation of God's timing being perfect as usual. At the very beginning of my ministry journey, a soon to finish Presbytery Minister offered to me his wisdom of service. And now here I was in the same position as Dennis knowing that Ueli was looking to me for confirmation and guidance. He is starting his journey as I start walking out the door. Nice!!

Life really is a series of bookends. It's full of de-ja-vus and mysterious dead-ends or discoveries and it seems, at times, that life folds over on itself and what you think is an ending is, in fact, a new beginning.

Christmas is always a time of beginnings and endings. Maybe because it sits so perilously close to the beginning of a new year and yet remains at the very end of the old. There's a sort of paradox here. We celebrate the newness of the Christ-child just as we wind down from the old year. I always think that Christmas should be moved to early to mid January or early February, a time when we are finally over the New Year celebrations. I never feel like I'm in the New Year until I stop finding myself writing last year's date on everything I sign.

But, it is what it is and I doubt I'm gonna get to change the date. Maybe it's one of the reasons I've always been a grinch at Christmas. It has never been my favourite time of the year. For me there is the paradox of celebrating newness of life as we reflect upon the end of another year. But maybe now, in this stage of my ministry and life, is the time for me to re-approach Christmas for its powerful stories of newness and hope, its bookend to the story of Christ's incarnation and the way this story has changed the world forever.

We will NEVER live in a "post-Christendom" world. Why? Because all the things we take for granted as being how the world works; from anti-slavery to women's rights to climate change activism and our legal codes all derive from this child born in a filthy manger so many years ago. Even Hindus, Buddhists, Muslims and atheists share in the benefits of this story. History folds over on itself even as the world strives to identify itself as anything but bound to the story of Christmas. Even if the world no longer cares, it carries the story of the hope of God forward in its very being.

While the church Ueli will be ordained into will be different to the church I was ordained into, it remains the very same church. Forever being renewed. Forever seeking God's new ways, new starts and sad endings. And the world around the church is still God's world. It still awaits the coming again of its Lord. Even if it has fallen asleep and seems unconscious to the Spirit. And despite all the secular nonsense flooding over the heart of the Christmas story, its still the story of Christ that remains at its heart. Christmas will never be drowned out by Santa Clauses and tinsel, because the narrative of peace and goodwill, the giving of gifts and the gathering of families, find their meaning in the story of the Gospel.

Teresa and I, Christy and Peter, Ana and Viliami and Robyn and Gavin all wish you a Merry Christmas. We count it a privilege to serve such a wonderful Presbytery. Each one of us value your support, your love and your prayers as we pray also for you.

This Christmas, may God plant anew a fire of hope in your soul. May the wails of the newborn and the cries of the crucified One be the bookends of the Incarnation that drives us to be all we can be in serving God as He renews His church and equips us for His glory.



# From The Word for Today...

# **Meditate on the Scriptures**

'I will meditate on Your precepts, and contemplate Your ways.' Psalm 119:15 NKJV

If you want to grow spiritually, you need a consistent diet of Scripture. In fact, you will never outgrow your diet of Scripture. There is no substitute. There is no supplement.

The poet T.S. Eliot said, 'Everything we eat has some ... effect upon us. It affects us during the process of assimilation and digestion; and I believe that exactly the same is true of anything we read.' We are what we read. But let's take that a step further. Reading without meditating is like eating without digesting. If you want to absorb the nutrients, you can't just read it; you have to chew on it.

Meditation is the way we metabolise Scripture. That's how it gets into our spirit and our soul. The French writer Jacques Réda had a particular habit. He would walk the streets of Paris with the purpose of seeing one new thing every day. It was how he renewed his love for the city.

We renew our love for God in a similar way. Our love grows as we see new dimensions of His personality, and His personality is predominantly revealed in the pages of the Bible. What if we approached God's Word the way Jacques Réda walked the streets of Paris? Here is the secret of spiritual growth: you can't merely read the Bible, you have to meditate on it.

Reading provides breadth to our understanding, but meditation provides depth. If all we do is read Scripture, our understanding of God and our experience with Him is one-dimensional. The Bible is a kaleidoscope. Each time you turn it, another beautiful pattern of truth is revealed.
